The 2011 Coburg 24 Hour Carnival was spread over 2 weekends, with the 6 Hour events held on Saturday $5^{\text {th }}$ March and the 24 Hour events held on the weekend of $16^{\text {th }}-17^{\text {th }}$ April.

Of the final field of 45 entrants in the 24 Hour Championships, 39 walkers and runners were present when the starter's gun was fired at 10AM on the Saturday morning. Intermittent cloud cover and a cool breeze during the day allowed all the runners and walkers to get off to a good start and by 6 PM , there were the makings of some fantastic performances. A very cold night meant a testing time but come Sunday morning most were still on the track and a good crowd was on hand to witness the final gun sound at 10AM.

## 24 Hour Run Men

This was the biggest field on paper with 20 starters. Race favourite Mick Francis was soon in command and, by the 5 hour mark, was over 3 km in front of his nearest rivals with a distance of 56 km . But disaster then struck as an old ankle injury flared and he was soon forced to withdraw. Little separated Malcolm Gamble, Justin Scholz, Trevor Allen, Rick Cooke and Keith Sullivan at that stage and we looked set for an interesting tussle. Mal was the one to respond most forcefully and, by the 12 hour mark, he had a clear lead with 120.4 km , some 3 km ahead of Justin with Mal a further 4 km in arrears. As the night progressed, Mal struggled and by the 18 hour mark, Justin had overtaken him and was now some 4 km in front with 168.4 km .

More twists were still to occur as Justin then started to slow, giving hope to those behind him. At the same time, Rick Cooke, running in his first 24 hour event, made his move, storming into second place and eating into Justin's lead. With a little over 2 hours to go, Rick took the lead and, from then on, it was just a case of how far he would get - a fantastic inaugural distance of 216.428 km . Behind him, Mal and Trevor also passed Justin as he slowed further. All four recorded PBs with Mal 210.810km, Trevor 206.417km and Justin 203.378. Special mention also to Paul Wright who was next in with 194.882 km , a massive PB.

## 24 Hour Run Women

The women's event saw Bernadette Benson shoot to the front, covering nearly 12 km in the first hour and looking fantastic. Behind her, Kerrie Bremner and Natalie Jennings were level pegging and running their own races a few laps behind. It soon became apparent that Bernadette was in record mode as she passed the 6 Hour mark with 70.4 km , the same distance she recorded in winning the Moe 6 Hour late last year. Her lead over Kerrie was now a massive 6.4 km with Natalie a further 3.6 km in arrears. She continued to power through to the 100 km mark, passing it in a new Canadian W40 record time of $8: 50: 38$. She had intended to keep going but her body said otherwise and she soon withdrew, happy with her run and content to now watch from the sidelines.

Kerrie reached the 12 Hour mark with a fantastic 119.6 km , in second place overall and less than 1 km behind race leader Mal Gamble. Natalie Jennings, with 115.6 km , was not far behind and was in fourth place overall. Alas, Natalie was soon on the sidelines, the great first 12 hours of the race taking its toll.

Kerrie showed great determination in the second half, hanging in for a final distance of 203.020 km , the fifth runner on the day to better 200 km . Julia Thorne, who had run her own race further back in the field, was rewarded with second place and a distance of 151.776 km while Natalie, even though she retired, still took third with 129.600 km .

## 24 Hour Walk Men

Dutch Centurion Martijn Van den Boogaard and British Centurion Mark Wall were expected to be the big guns in the men's walk and they were right on schedule for their 100 mile targets with 12 hour splits of 86.94 km and 85.698 km respectively. Steve Jordan, with 84.456 km , was not far behind and also looked strong while Lou Commins, with 81.558 km , was also in the hunt. But while Mark continued on his merry way, Martijn and the others were in trouble, all slowing and falling behind schedule.

The final results tell the story. Mark powered through the 100 mile mark in 23:20:41 to become Australian Centurion number 59 while most of the other walkers, Martijn, Steve and Lou included, slowed and were forced to take time out. Martijn eventually took second with 136.436 km but he was very disappointed with his walk. Lou took third with 135.011 km . Special mentions to Doug McKay and John Voitin who both showed great determination, continuously circling the track for the full 24 hours to record 133.752 km and 111.404 km respectively.

## 24 Hour Walk Women

The women's walk saw last year's 24 Hour Run winner Michelle Thompson in action as a walker and was she good. By the 6 Hour mark, she had covered 49.680 km to be first walker overall, 1 km ahead of Mark Wall, and on target for a big time. Karyn O'Neill was second at that point with 45.560 km and Dawn Parris was third with 42.642 km .

From then on, it was the Michelle show as she powered through to set new W40 Australian records for 50 miles, 12 Hours, $100 \mathrm{~km}, 100$ miles (she became Australian Centurion number 58 with her 100 mile split of 22:03:37) and 24 Hours, finishing with 172.593 km , just short of her 172.906 km which she recorded in winning last year's Coburg 24 Hour Run. Now that's an interesting statistic!

Karyn O'Neill walked her best race for many years, digging deep to pass the 100 mile mark in 23:44:26. Of course, Karyn is already an Australian Centurion, having qualified in 2002 with 23:35:56, and this was a very popular comeback. English walker Serena Queeney added some 6 km to her best to take third with 153.638 km , tantalisingly close to the 100 mile standard, and we hope that with further experience and training, she can achieve the elusive walking standard.

Susannah Harvey-Jamieson had been expected to fight out the 24 Hour run but disaster struck in the final days as her foot flared up after a run. Rather than miss the event, she opted to swap to the walk, taking fourth place with a commendable 137.829 km , just ahead of Dawn Parris with 134.949 km . A special mention to Diana Kelly who strolled for the full 24 hours, always smiling and obviously enjoying the experience, her final distance 114.895 km
